

### CONCLUSION



Wright was 78 years old when this Blackstone-Shelburne Studio portrait photograph was produced in 1945.

**FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT** (1869-1959) is acknowledged, by the American Institute of Architects, as the greatest American architect of the twentieth century. He designed over five hundred buildings in a brilliant career. Several are recognized as landmarks of architecture. Wright was honored with a 2<sup>c</sup> stamp issued in 1966. The stamp, one of the Prominent Americans series by the United States Post Office Department, was issued in panes of 100 stamps. In 1968, it was issued in a booklet pane format with five stamps per pane. In 1971 and 1975, it was again reissued in a booklet pane format but with six stamps per pane.

This First Day Cover exhibit explores the stamp design, production and varieties, first day postmarks, archival cachet production materials, an extensive first day cover study followed by a comprehensive survey of Commercial Usage.


The progressive die essay archive of the Frank Lloyd Wright issue shows the portrait was engraved first. The BEP portrait engraver was Arthur Dintaman.


